Can you share a brief overview of your work?

Can you share a brief overview of your work?

I study intergroup relations, collective action dynamics, and the political attitudes of disadvantaged groups. My current research focuses on understanding the implications of the war in Gaza, both within Palestine and in the United States. In Palestine, my research examines how experiences of oppression and violence under Israeli occupation impact Palestinians' emotional responses and their willingness to engage in acts of resistance. In the U.S., my research explores how the ongoing war in Gaza is shaping American attitudes toward the issue of Palestine. Recently, I have been investigating how the war has influenced voting decisions among Arab and Muslim Americans in the 2024 presidential election. I am also studying U.S. media coverage of the war, with a particular focus on the language used in reporting, and how this shapes public perceptions of responsibility for war crimes.

What would you say most motivates you in your work? What are you most excited/passionate about?

There is so much that can be said about motivation, and I don't feel that I can boil it down to a simple answer.

What do you like to do in your spare time/when you're not at work?

I enjoy hikes, books, jigsaw puzzles, and historical drama series.

What is one thing about Santa Cruz that you are excited to explore or learn more about?

I've heard that Santa Cruz is known for its ghost stories and I'm curious to learn more about these eerie tales and supernatural folklore. I'm also curious about the pirate legends tied to the area.

What might someone be surprised to learn about you?

I'm typically a risk-averse person and not adventurous, but 8 years ago, I

As a quantitative methodologist, I develop and evaluate statistical methods for use in psychology and social sciences research. Currently, I'm extending causal mediation analysis methods to assess how a set of educational programs influence child development through different pathways and how these effects may vary across subpopulations. Another project I'm excited about involves studying close relationships using dyadic data analysis methods, focusing on how different measurement models (e.g., multiple manifest variables, composite scores, or latent constructs) shape our understanding.

What would you say most motivates you in your work? What are you most excited/passionate about?

I'm most motivated when I see something both intriguing and impactful. In my research and teaching, that often means discovering the unintended consequences of seemingly objective methodological choices. People often think of statistics as purely numerical and objective, but it's fascinating to recognize how much these numbers can reflect hidden assumptions. Tailoring methods to best serve research questions is a challenge I truly enjoy.

What do you like to do in your spare time/when you're not at work?

I love immersing myself in stories and music. Whether it's revisiting an epic tale (with the shorter days, it's the perfect time for a Lord of the Rings marathon!) or listening to every possible recording of a musical piece, these distractions energize me and remind me to savor the blessings in life.
